Keynote

William N. Williams, PhD Professor and Director University of Florida Craniofacial Center Gainesville, FL

What's the Big Deal about Velopharyngeal Insufficiency? What Does a Little Hypernasality Matter?

The keynote presentation will describe why velopharyngeal insufficiency (VPI), an often relatively small opening into the nasal cavity, can cause such troubling speech problems. Information will be presented on the importance of speech sounding "normal," and what happens to speech (resonance, articulation and voice) when the soft palate is not capable of closing off the opening (velopharyngeal port). Information also will be presented in commonly used strategies in correcting VPI including various surgical techniques, oral prosthetic devices, and/or speech therapy. The presentation will focus on how to best evaluate information provided by the team about velopharyngeal dysfunction, and understanding the reason for a specific treatment plan.

Dr. Bill Williams is Director and Professor of the University of Florida Craniofacial Center. He is a Fellow of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) and is past president of the Florida Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Association. He is a recipient of the Florida Speech-Language-Hearing Association's Clinical Achievement Award, and the Honors of the Florida Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Association. He has published extensively on the topic of communicative disorders associated with craniofacial malformations. Dr. Williams is currently serving as principal investigator of an international NIH/NIDCR clinical trial investigating velopharyngeal function for speech for patients undergoing the von Langenbeck and the Furlow double z-palatoplasty in repairing cleft lip and palate.

Developmental Disabilities National Center on Birth Defects and Developmental Disabilities Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

Advancing the Understanding of Craniofacial Anomalies

This presentation will include a discussion of activities at the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in the area of craniofacial anomalies, with a focus on research activities. The goal of these research activities is to identify factors that increase or decrease the chance that a baby is born with a craniofacial anomaly. In this presentation, Dr. Rasmussen will discuss the National Birth Defects Prevention Study, a large, multi-site, casecontrol study aimed at understanding genetic and nongenetic (environmental) factors for birth defects, including orofacial clefts. Other CDC activities that address craniofacial anomalies will also be briefly discussed.

Dr. Sonja Rasmussen received her Master's degree in Medical Genetics from the University of Wisconsin and her MD degree with honors from University of Florida College of Medicine. She completed her pediatrics residency training at Massachusetts General Hospital and her fellowship training in clinical genetics at Johns Hopkins Hospital and University of Florida. She is board certified in Pediatrics, Clinical Genetics and Genetic Counseling. Dr. Rasmussen joined the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in Atlanta in 1998 and currently serves as Senior Scientist for CDC's Division of Birth Defects and Developmental Disabilities. She has published nine book chapters and over 80 papers in the peer-reviewed literature. Her research interests include the identification of genetic and environmental risk factors for birth defects, mortality associated with genetic conditions, and the impact of infections on the pregnant woman and her fetus.



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Moebius Syndrome

"Faces of Distinction"

What is Moebius Syndrome?

Moebius Syndrome is a rare disorder characterized by lifetime facial paralysis. People with Moebius Syndrome can't smile or frown, and they often can't blink or move their eyes from side to side. The most apparent symptoms are related to facial expressions and function. In newborn infants, the first sign is an impaired ability to suck. Excessive drooling and crossed eyes may be present. Two important nerves - the sixth and seventh cranial nerves - are not fully developed, causing eye muscle and facial paralysis. Many of the other 12 cranial nerves may also be affected. In addition, there can be deformities of the tongue and jaw, and even of some limbs, including club foot and missing or webbed fingers. Most children have low muscle tone, particularly of the upper body. Moebius Syndrome is sometimes accompanied by Pierre Robin Syndrome, Poland's Anomaly and/or Autism Spectrum Disorder.

The mission of the Moebius Syndrome Foundation is to provide information and support to individuals with Moebius Syndrome and their families, promote greater awareness and understanding of Moebius Syndrome, and to advocate for scientific research to advance the diagnosis and treatment of Moebius Syndrome and its associated conditions.

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
